Grade 3-4

This week, our biggest highlight was constructing a play area for our class chickens! This hands-on experience helped them understand construction and teamwork in a meaningful way.

In Math, we are wrapping up our study of area, solving real-world word problems and deepening our understanding of measurement.











Grade 5-8 (Math and Science)

This week in Math, grade 5 learned how to regroup fractions in order to subtract them. Grade 6 began learning how to find the volume of 3D shapes with fractional side lengths. Grade 7 completed their lesson on expressing numbers as terminating or repeating decimals. Grade 8 continued their lesson on deriving linear equations.

In Science, grades 5 and 6 learned about the properties of light waves. Grades 7 and 8 learned about the circulatory system and they are super excited about the heart dissection that will hopefully take place next week!























Grade 5-8 (English and Social Studies)

This week the grade 5/6 class continued reading *The Land of Stories*. We engaged in some opinionated and critical dialogue in regards to the characters and the plot. In social studies we carried on building our Mayan pyramids and also began preparing for our Black History Month performance at the end of February. It's going to be good; we recommend you attend;) In grade 7/8 students worked in pairs to read through a portion *The Coddling of the American Mind,* in addition to working through personalized iReady lessons. In social studies students prepared and presented additional information in regards to the current global conflicts they have been learning about.
