In Science we continue to learn about amazing plants. This week's lesson we learnt about the different parts of plants and trees. We focused on each parts function and used our writing skills to label them.




Grade 1-2

Grade 3-4

This week, Grades 3 and 4 students visited Kerri Town, a small settlement in Freetown. During the visit, they had the opportunity to meet with the Headman of the community, as well as his Deputy and Secretary. The community leaders shared the rich history of Kerri Town and how it was founded.

The Headman, a descendant of the second settler, recounted his family's story. His great-grandfather was originally from Guinea but was sold into slavery. After slavery was abolished, he was brought to Freetown, Sierra Leone. However, he chose not to return to Guinea due to his resentment over being sold. Instead, he walked from Freetown to Kerri Town, where he met the first settler, Pa Kerri, and decided to stay.

The students were deeply engaged, asking numerous questions and having insightful conversations with the community leaders. They explored various aspects of village life, visiting the local school, mosque, farm, river, playground, garden, traditional kitchen, deep water well, and even a historic graveyard. They also visited the "Baray," the community gathering place where disputes are resolved.

It was a fascinating and immersive learning experience. The students thoroughly enjoyed the trip, returning to school exhausted but enriched by all they had seen and learned.






Grade 5-8 (Math and Science)

This week in middle school Math, grade 5 began their final lesson of unit 2, adding and subtracting fractions in word problems. Grade 6 began reviewing for their unit 2 assessment. Grade 7 completed their lesson on using the four operations with negative numbers. Grade 8 began solving linear equations in one variable.

In Science, grades 5 and 6 learned the parts of the eye and optical illusions. Grades 7 and 8 studied the heart.














Grade 5-6 (Donation)

Grades 5 and 6 went on a short field trip to Wilberforce School on Thursday to donate school supplies. The school has 300 students in grades 4, 5 and 6 and they were very appreciative of our donation. Grade 5-8 (English and Social Studies)

This week in ELA the grade 5/6 class practiced new ways to read together as a group, in addition to reflecting on the content of the book and completing personalized i-Ready lessons. The grade 7/8 class prepared for a class discussion that will take place next week, in addition to completing personalized i-Ready lessons. While in social studies the 5/6 class completed their Mayan pyramids and finished their study of the ancient societies of South America with a reflective lesson on the impact of the Mayan, Aztecs, and Inca. In grade 7/8, students both researched what it means to be on the political left and right, and how this might affect policy and one's general outlook on the world. This activity is connected to an ongoing unit on media literacy. In addition, students began building models of the Colosseum to wrap up their unit on Ancient Rome.

French (Middle School)

Grade 7 and 8 are discovering their new workbook, *Français Plus 4*. The students immediately noticed that the level is higher and were ready to face the new challenge. In the first lesson the school vocabulary is revised, but also many new words were added. The comprehension texts are longer and new is the oral comprehension: we listen to a dialogue and try to understand it by answering questions about it. The students also started doing role plays in class. It's time to start using the language! The conjugation of *avoir* and *s'appeler* was revised and new was how to use *tu* and *vous* in French. It can be complicated for English speakers, since there is only one translation for both: you.

The Francophones learned new words in the text they read about a hat with a defect, and they made lots of exercises on the agreement of adjective and noun in French and the conjugation of the *passé compose* with *être*.

But it is also Black History Month. Since we don't want to limit ourselves to France, we watched a video on how this month is celebrated all over the world. But we came back to France, learned about the Afro-Americans that came to Europe during the Second World War and focused in particular on the amazing life of Josephine Baker. It was a pleasure to see how the music of the song we analyzed, *J'ai deux amours* (1930), was appreciated by the young ears of the students.
