#### **Bits and Pieces**

I continue to receive questions about security during the upcoming election campaign and AISF's position. To that end, I met with the Regional Security Officer from the US Embassy this past week to discuss the Embassy posture and the school's plans. For the moment, we remain watchful and attentive; the Embassy plans to remain open throughout. Fortunately, our school year ends over a week before the voting and some two weeks before the results are likely to be released. We are ready to go live with AISF Home Learning for at home learning on any days when it might not be safe to bring students and staff to school.

The Spring break is coming up soon. Our last school day will be Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> April as Good Friday falls on the 7<sup>th</sup>. AISF will reopen on Monday the 17<sup>th</sup>. The following week is a bit messy—Eid al-Fitr may begin on the evening of Friday 21<sup>st</sup> April means Saturday the 22<sup>nd</sup> would be a public holiday so it is likely that Monday the 24 would be a holiday. Thursday of the same week is Sierra Leone Independence Day, another public holiday, so we will be closed again then. And then we come to May 1 which appears as a public holiday on some sites but not others. Once we get through that period, I don't anticipate any more holidays before we close on 16<sup>th</sup> June!!


In Social Studies, 7/8 presented their projects, which explored the question *Can disease change the world?* and its connections with bubonic plague pandemic in the 14th century. 5/6 began learning about Mount Everest; in this unit, we will explore its geography as well as the economic & environmental implications of its popularity.

This past Wednesday, students from across the elementary and middle school participated in an Introduction to Screenwriting class. We learned the basic format of a screenplay, watched relevant videos, and began writing brief scenes in groups!















# Grade 5-8 (Math and Science)

This week in Science, grades 5 and 6 began their trimester 3 module of Waves. We spent the week looking at optical illusions and trying to determine why we saw different things. The students then attempted making their own optical illusions. Check them out and see what you see!

Grades 7 and 8 are wrapping up cells and genetics with one last project on animal and plant cells.

In Math, grade 5 completed their unit on division and are preparing for an end of module assessment. Grade 6 is preparing for an assessment on simplifying expressions and solving equations. Grades 7 and 8 began their unit on statistics and took an assessment on measures of central tendency.








### Art
